Scientific Name	Common Name	Comments
<p><u><i>Akebia quinata</i></u></p> 	Fiveleaf Akebia	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Semi-evergreen/deciduous vine • 5 leaflets (Latin: <i>quintus</i>) • Light rose-purple flowers typically lost in foliage • Aggressive twining vine • Sun or shade
<p><u><i>Bignonia capreolata</i></u></p> 	Crossvine	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Semi-evergreen, native vine • Climbs by twining and tendrils • Beautiful trumpet shaped flowers in April, orange/yellow/red with darker tube
<p><u><i>Celastrus scandens</i></u></p> 	Bittersweet	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Deciduous vine • Climbs by twining (requires support) • Flowers not showy • Fruit showy (dioecious); frequently used in dried flower arrangements • Sun
<p><u><i>Campsis radicans</i></u></p> 	Common Trumpetcreeper	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Vigorous, deciduous vine • Climbs by root-like holdfasts • Beautiful tubular, orange/red flowers in summer • Fruit pod (capsule) 5 to 8" long • sun
<p><u><i>Clematis Hybrids</i></u></p> 	Clematis	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Deciduous vine • Twining vine (requires support) • Known for beautiful, large flowers; white, pink, purple in May • Keep roots shaded and moist

<p><i>Ficus pumila</i></p> 	<p>Creeping Fig; Climbing Fig</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Broadleaf evergreen vine • Climbs by aerial rootlets (attaches to structures) • Zone 8 (7) • Juvenile: leaves smaller and cling tighter to wall; adult: leaves larger, plant sticks out further, flowers and fruits • Sun or shade
<p><i>Gelsemium sempervirens</i></p> 	<p>Carolina Jasmine</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Broadleaf evergreen vine • Climbs by twining (requires support) • Showy yellow flowers in February/March • Best flowering in full sun
<p><i>Lonicera japonica</i></p> 	<p>Japanese Honeysuckle *</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Semi-evergreen vine/ground cover in Arkansas • White flowers in late spring; black berry • Climbs by twining • Invasive; avoid using in landscapes
<p><i>Lonicera sempervirens</i></p> 	<p>Trumpet Honeysuckle</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Deciduous vine • Spectacular tubular, yellow or yellow/orange or red flowers in April; great for hummingbirds • Twining vine
<p><i>Parthenocissus tricuspidata</i></p> 	<p>Boston Ivy</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Deciduous vine • Climbs by root-like holdfasts • Maroon fall color • Latin: <i>tricuspidata</i> = '3 lobes'

<p><i>Parthenocissus quinquefolia</i></p> 	Virginia Creeper	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • deciduous vine • Climbs by adhesive tendrils (sticks to structures) • Maroon fall color • Sun or shade • Quinquefolia = 5 leaflets (Latin: <i>quintus</i>)
<p><i>Trachelospermum jasminoides</i></p> 	Confederate Jasmine	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Broadleaf evergreen ground cover/vine (requires support for vine) • Glossy, dark green leaves • Showy, white stars in April/May • Zone 8
<p><i>Vitis sp.</i></p> 	Grape	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Deciduous vine • Full sun • Twining vine (requires support) • Edible fruits
<p><i>Wisteria sp.</i></p> 	Wisteria	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Deciduous vine • Spectacular, fragrant purple (or white) flower panicles in April • Twining vine (requires support)
